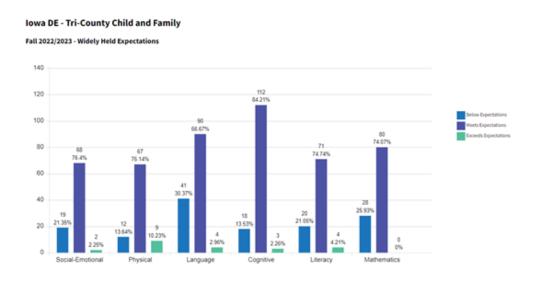

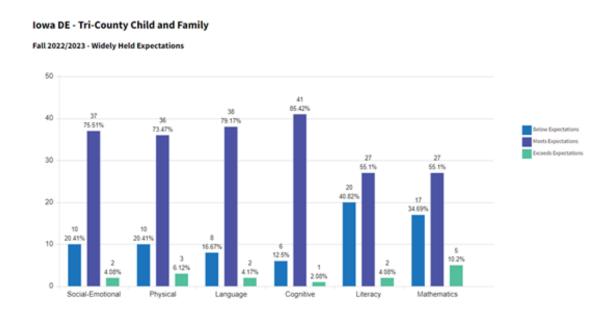

Hello, families! This month I want to share the results of our Fall GOLD Checkpoint data for our various sites and partnerships that serve Early Head Start and Head Start children. You might be thinking, what is GOLD? Teaching Strategies GOLD focuses on 38 objectives for development and learning that indicate what children need to know and do to be ready for school. It is research-based and observations take place during everyday experiences in the classroom. All teachers in our agency assess children three times per year using these objectives. The overall data from Fall is shared and discussed below. Your child's teacher will share individual GOLD data, including areas of strength and areas of need, at your child's conference. If you have questions at any time, please be sure to reach out to your home visitor or your child's teacher!

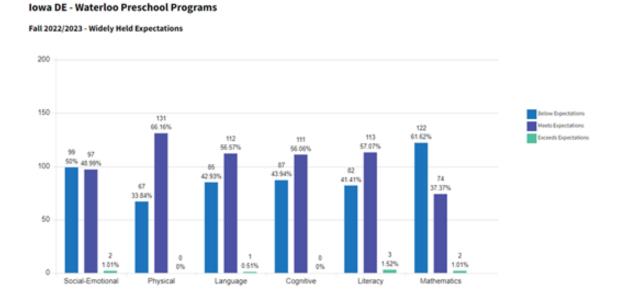
For fall agency-wide Early Head Start, the area with the highest percentage of children meeting expectations was cognitive. The area with the highest percentage of children not meeting expectations was language. See below.



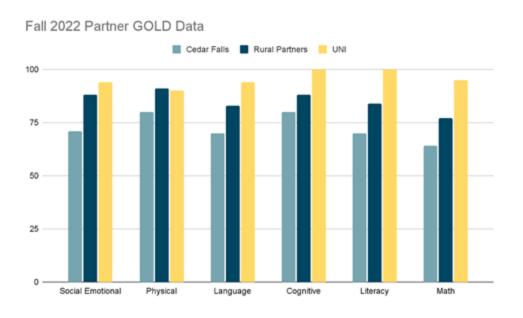
For fall agency-wide Head Start, the area with the highest percentage of children meeting expectations was cognitive. The area with the highest percentage of children not meeting expectations was literacy. See below.



For fall Head Start Waterloo only, the area with the highest percentage of children meeting expectations was physical. The area with the highest percentage of children not meeting expectations was math. See below.



For our partners (Cedar Falls Head Start; Rural Partners Head Start including Jesup, Dunkerton, East Buchanan, and Independence; and UNI Child Development Center Early Head Start) the areas with the highest percentage of children meeting expectations included the following: physical and cognitive for Cedar Falls, physical for Rural Partners, and cognitive and literacy for UNI. The areas with the highest percentage of children not meeting expectations included the following: math for Cedar Falls and Rural Partners and physical for UNI. Per our agency's process for GOLD at our sites (Maywood and Lily) and home visitor program, teachers and home visitors completed a Checkpoint Summary & Action Plan to individualize for each child on weekly lesson plans. In addition, teachers and home visitors participated in networking sessions with peers to discuss data and plan for the children in their classroom. Once the Winter checkpoint data is available, comparisons will be made to determine the effectiveness of individualization and next steps for professional development. We appreciate everything our staff and partnership staff do in the classroom and on home visits to support the growth and development of children. We also appreciate what families do. It makes a difference! Everyone's efforts help the children in our programs to thrive and enter kindergarten ready to learn!

#### February is Dental Health Month

#### Walker Dental

Walker Dental continues to partner with Tri-County Head Start to provide dental services to enrolled families



in Early Head Start and Head Start. This month students from the Hawkeye Community College Dental Hygiene program will work with Dr. Walker to complete oral screens and exams at our centers. Contact your Family Service Worker or Home Visitor to sign up for your child's screening or dental exam.

#### Cavities: What do they look like?

- A cavity may look whiter than the rest of your tooth.
- It may also look like a hole in your tooth that is brown, black or yellow.
- At the dentist they may do an x-ray to see the cavity.
- You may have one if your tooth hurts when you are eating hot, cold, or sweet foods or are chewing any kind of food.
- Cavities may not hurt until they get big so it's important to see your dentist every 6 months so they can take care of cavities before they hurt.

#### What can I do to prevent cavities?

- You should brush your teeth at least two times a day.
- Flossing between your teeth at least once a day can get rid of germs that cause cavities.
- If you eat food that is good for you it won't cause cavities and will help prevent cavities.
- Germs eat sugar to survive. When they eat sugar they produce acid that eats away at your teeth and makes cavities.

#### Baby teeth are important for children to:

- Chew and eat food. Children need to eat healthy foods every day to grow and be strong. Children with tooth decay are less likely to eat crunchy foods, such as fresh fruits and vegetables. Being able to eat these foods promotes good nutrition and a healthy weight.
- **Speak clearly.** Children who lose baby teeth too early may have trouble making certain sounds. This can make it hard to understand the child. A child may need speech therapy to improve speech problems that may develop because of missing teeth.
- Keep space for adult teeth. Baby teeth hold space for adult teeth growing

in the jaw. If a baby tooth is lost too early, other teeth that are already in the mouth will move into the spaces. It can block out the adult tooth trying to come in and cause crowding. The upper and lower jaws may not meet properly because of the crooked teeth.

- **Stay healthy.** Tooth decay in baby teeth can lead to infections that can cause fever and pain. If not treated, the infection from tooth decay can spread to other parts of the head and neck and lead to severe swelling.
- Have self-confidence. Children with decayed front teeth tend to not smile
  or may cover their mouth when talking. Sometimes they stop playing with
  other children. A healthy smile helps give children the self-confidence
  needed to have good social experiences.
