



Fire Safety

Fires and burns are one of the leading causes of death for children under the age of 15. Preventing house fires is the key to keeping children safe.

Here are some tips from Save the Children's safety experts on how to keep children safe in a fire.

- **Teach children fire safety.**
 - Teach children how to prevent and survive a fire. Model safe behaviors when using fires. Explain that fire is a tool, not a toy.
- **Install smoke alarms.**
 - Install smoke alarms in several rooms in your home. Use the test button every month and replace batteries at least once a year. Teach children what smoke alarms sound like.
- **Teach children about firefighters.**
 - Teach children what firefighters look like. Take them to your local fire department to meet firefighters so they are not scared.
- **Keep matches and lighters out of reach.**
 - Store matches and lighters out of children's reach and sight. If a child finds matches or lighters let them know to tell an adult.
- **Keep children away from flames and heat sources.**
 - Never leave children unattended near stoves or burning candles, even for a short time.
- **Teach children 9-1-1 (or local emergency number).**
 - Help children understand how and when to call 9-1-1 for help.
- **Practice fire drills.**
 - Include children in planning and practicing home fire drills. Have fire drills at least twice a year.
- **Demonstrate how to escape.**
 - Show children how to get out of a room filled with smoke by crawling along the floor to the nearest door.
- **Get out and stay out.**
 - If there's a fire, get everybody out. Don't go back into the home to get your stuff.



Teach children to STOP-DROP-and-ROLL if their clothes catch on fire. Stop (don't run), drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Then roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.


Head Start Health Services News



Good nutrition can help protect your child against lead absorption. Feed your child regular meals. Children with an empty stomach are more likely to absorb lead.

Studies have shown **foods high in calcium, vitamin C, and iron help the body absorb less lead.**

- Calcium rich foods: milk, yogurt, cheese and green leafy vegetables like spinach
- Vitamin C rich foods: oranges, green and red peppers, 100% juice
- Iron rich foods: lean red meats, beans, peanut butter and cereal



Lead is toxic

Lead exposure is especially dangerous to children's developing brains and can result in

- Reduced intelligence quotient (IQ) and attention span
- Impaired learning ability
- Increased risk of behavioral problems

to multiple body systems, such as our central nervous system and brain; reproductive system; kidneys, cardiovascular system, blood and immune system.

Early ACCESS

for infants, toddlers and families

Do you or your child's teacher/home visitor have concerns with how your child is learning and developing? Early ACCESS is here to help. Early ACCESS supports children up to 3 years of age and their families/caregivers.

How can you help your baby to learn?

TALK! LISTEN! RESPOND!

- **Talk**, talk and then talk some more. Talk about what you are doing and what your child is doing.
- **Listen** and show excitement when your child uses new sounds.
- **Respond** to your child even if it's just crying or making noises. Talk about objects, people, and activities that get your child's attention.
